So, Where Does That Leave Us?

I have zero confidence in the capability of our political parties to solve any of the crucial problems facing our nation and our world, including culturally and politically embedded racial violence and looming climate catastrophe, among many other troubles. These are existential issues for our culture, our country, and human life, and they are made more intractable by citizens' disillusion, distrust, or even rejection of democracy's processes and fundamental principles.

As the political parties and legislative bodies stagnate (and even make things worse), the hot topic of "reimagining policing" has become Last Year's Problem even to many on the left. Income inequality continues to climb. And most of us now find ourselves bunkered—and blinkered—with only the likeminded. Millions cling to "<u>The Big Lie</u>" in the face of all evidence that demonstrates we conducted one of the best-run, fairest elections in U.S. history.

So where does this litany of woe leave us? Well, coming from "deep left field," my faith is in community, in our ability, one human to another, to work toward something better. It may seem odd given my somewhat anarchist leanings that I'm actually a huge fan of big government, because that's the "organ" through which the community can act. Unfortunately, organizing and acting through our constitutionally constructed bodies, nationally and locally, can be glacially slow. We don't have time for glacial. None of the problems we face are amenable to patiently waiting.

So again, where does that leave us?

- *The long game* is, of course, to continue doing what we're doing, contacting our national leadership about our concerns and working to elect people who actively make the world better.
- *Medium-term*—and this is where liberal small-d democrats have failed to show up over the past four or so decades—we need to work in our local communities, learning how things have gone so far off track, voting up and down the ballot for candidates who believe in inclusive democracy, and working with our neighbors to make it better, little by little.
- **The immediate response**, though, is direct action—*showing up*, whether marching or through actual civil disobedience. For example, if 500 or a couple thousand folks get arrested handing out water at a Georgia polling station, it might make an impression.

As Frantz Fanon said, "By any means necessary." I say, by all means.

CCDD Monthly Takeaways

Dr. Danielle Allen, renowned democracy scholar and then-candidate for governor of Massachusetts, stepped out of her candidate's role and offered us a perspective on the current state of U.S. democracy in CCDD's February meeting. Below are some takeaways relevant to CCDD's mission:

- 1. Local level engagement is the starting point and centerpiece for rebuilding trust and restoring citizen faith in democracy.
- 2. Efforts to build communities should begin by focusing on issues of local importance.
- 3. The states are a crucible for grassroots democracy experimentation and innovation.
- 4. The states are essential actors in shaping the voting process, so citizens should participate as fully as possible in developing state election laws.
- 5. Many American youth are disengaged from the body politic. (In fact only 30% of those 40 and younger think that it's essential to live in a democracy as opposed to 70% of that age group believing democracy was the best way of life pre-World War II.) We must find new ways to reach out to the under-40 generations.
- 6. We need to pay close attention to social media, both to respond to false statements and to use the platform as a key means of sending our messages, especially those targeting young people.
- 7. We need to invest heavily in civic education from pre-school through university.
- 8. We must reestablish an American moral compass with values of truth, integrity, honesty, inclusion and love of country.
- 9. Be optimistic—Americans across the country are working to strengthen local communities and our foundational institutions.
